WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING.....

Pocket Park (Parson's Spinney)

The Pocket Park project has continued this year with a new path being laid between the Bridleway entrance and the pond. This is providing a firm and durable surface which is less prone to becoming muddy in wet weather. It has certainly been put to the test this winter.

If you have ventured into the park in recent weeks you will have seen just how high the water level in the pond has become. As is the case everywhere, the constant rain has had an impact but the level will recede once the weather improves. In the meantime please take care around the pond area.

The project to improve the area will continue, discussions have begun to explore the possibility of putting a boardwalk at the end of the pond which remains passable but does get very muddy during the Winter months. This will extend the Winter access route a little further.

The excess vegetation which was building up in the pond was removed by specialist contractors to ensure that open water is retained to encourage wildlife. Anyone who saw a boat on the pond was not dreaming, they really did sail around the pond to do their work.

Broughton Parish Council hope that you enjoy the Pocket Park, we are fortunate to have such a wonderful environment on our doorstep.



Noticeboard

We have a new noticeboard outside the Co-Op,. This has replaced our old one which had gone beyond repair. Please look out for our news on upcoming meetings and items of interest. Our large community noticeboard is staying in place on the corner of Church Street (outside the Red Lion) – more notices can be found there and village groups are able to use this facility to share their news.

Hot Topics

There are a couple of requests to be made. The first one is for everyone to please park throughout the Village with consideration for others.

Broughton was built before cars came about and in places it really isn't straightforward in today's world of often multiple cars per household.

However, we have to work with what we have and sometimes things can be made a bit easier if we work together.

Firstly, if you have a driveway, please do use it as this can only help.

If you are parking on the road please take a moment to think if your parking could be causing someone else a problem – this can be for other vehicles eg are you obscuring visibility near a junction and equally for pedestrians – are you obscuring their visibility, not leaving enough room on the footpath for them to pass safely or making someone with a pram or wheelchair walk in the road.

Secondly, parking on Cransley Hill at school drop off and pick up times is contentious and has been for a very long time. The appropriate road markings and signage are in place and all car drivers are requested to observe these at all times.

Many parents do walk their children to school but for some who are going on to work or who are travelling in to the village, walking obviously isn't practical and they need their vehicles.

For parents who are using their cars, please do whatever you can to park with consideration and with due regard for the safety of all children, pedestrians, residents and other vehicles.

Do not park irresponsibly or dangerously. If parking is not available immediately outside the school, please allow yourself a few minutes so that you can park a little bit further away and walk the remainder to the school itself.

Escaping driveways!

We are experiencing some issues in the Village with gravel from driveways creeping over footpaths.

If you have a drive with escaping gravel, could you please ensure that this is kept to a minimum and gravel is swept back into your drive. This will help hugely for all pedestrians, those with reduced mobility or who are trying to push wheelchairs or prams.

Free Food in the Chapel

The Broughton bags 4 Good food table is available at the Chapel - please feel free to make use of this food - The Chapel is trying to help reduce food waste with the supermarkets by keeping these distributions open. Food Donations are very varied each time as it is simply what becomes available. The Food Table is open each Tuesday and Friday at 10am. Tea, coffee and a chat are also available!

Pytchley Crossroads

Well, we wrote about it in the last Newsletter and Pytchley Crossroads has been high on the Parish Council's list of issues for very many years. We have worked with Pytchley Parish Council and Highways during all of this time and have always tried to keep it high on everyone else's agenda.

As we know, we experienced an increased number of accidents last year which raised the level of concern even higher. After having had 2 family members experience crashes there, resident Laura Staniscia had been collating information via Facebook and the Parish Council had been notifying Highways of each incident.

All of this led to a bit of a breakthrough on the media front with the Evening Telegraph initially and then we had a visit from ITV News. Highways have been escalating on their side and we have seen in the last weeks some remedial improvements.

We now have a Stop sign and refreshed markers. As ever, all parties hope that something in these alterations will trigger a change in the number of accidents but as we are all at a loss as to why the multiple existing signage wasn't alerting drivers to the Crossroads before, we remain cautious in our expectations.



Memorial Garden (Garden of Reflection)

The memorial garden at the bottom of the park in the High Street has been a neglected area and sometimes troublesome spot for many years and whilst the whole park is owned and managed by North Northants Council, Broughton Parish Council has been in discussion with them to be allowed to pick it up and give it some focus.

The principal reason for the Garden becoming lost and without focus is the fact that the new Memorial is now situated at the corner of Northampton Road/Wellingborough Road. In keeping in line with the original purpose, the intention now is to create a Garden of Reflection instead.

Mr. Darlow got us off to a great start as he made a gift to the Parish Council in remembrance of his brother, long serving Parish Councillor and former Chairman, Malcolm Darlow. A small crab apple tree was planted last year and watered (a lot!) throughout summer. We can say that the tree is showing good growth this spring and we hope that it is now well established and will flourish.

A planting scheme has been drawn up for ornamental grasses to be grown in the central area, Broughton Scouts have built a bug hotel which will be placed soon in the garden. Some work has already been started by members of the Parish Council so watch this space as it evolves, we hope that in time, everyone will come to enjoy it and spend a moment there with their thoughts.
